It is hard to conceive of any rituals more beautiful and inspiring or any ceremonies in Masonry more soul stirring and profound than the Tenebraê and the Feast of the Paschal Lamb or, as it is often called, the Mystic Banquet or Feast Obligatory. To our Jewish Brethren, it signifies the Feast of the Passover, which is an annual reminder of the priceless heritage of freedom and a call to 10 struggle for it by eternal vigilance. To our Christian 11 Brethren, it signifies the Last Supper Jesus and His 12 Disciples attended to celebrate this ancient festival, 13 after which there followed His death and resurrection.

The Passover was a festival instituted to commemorate 16 Jehovah's "passing over" the Israelite houses while 17 "passing through" those of the Egyptians in order to 18 destroy the firstborn of each household. In the early 19 history of these celebrations, a lamb without blemish was 20 taken from the flock on the 10th and killed on the 14th day 21 of the Hebrew month Abib (ear of corn) which is in the 22 modern Hebrew Calendar the month of Nisan, which occurred 23 at the spring of the year. The blood of the lamb was to be 24 sprinkled on the two side posts and the upper door post, 25 and the flesh eaten with unleavened bread and bitter herbs 26 before the morning. Jehovah, passing over the blood-27 stained doors, slew the firstborn in the Egyptian houses 28 not similarly protected. St. Paul likens the Paschal Feast 29 to the resurrection of Christ, but, no matter what the 30 interpretation, in Masonry it has no creedal significance. 31 To our Brethren of the Rose Croix, it is known as the 32 Mystic Banquet, and it is obligatory, at least in spirit, 33 for every Knight Rose Croix, on this special day, to break 34 bread with a Brother and partake of a portion of roasted This beautiful ceremony is but another method of 36 bringing to our minds those great moral truths which we 37 already have been taught. It is in that spirit that we 38 assemble, as Masons and Brethren, bound with solemn ties 39 and no thought of any particular creed or religion.

Where the members are gathered for dinner prior to 42 Tenebraê, the ceremony of Extinguishing the Lights, the 43 symbolism of the Mystic Banquet should be explained to the 44 Knights attending the ceremonies. They are as follows:

- 1 1. The Matzo, or unleavened bread is also called Bread of
 2 Affliction. It is symbolic of the bread, which the Hebrews
 3 made when they hastily left Egypt, because they did not
 4 have enough time to allow their dough to leaven. The Matzo
 5 is the most important symbol of the Passover.
- 7 2. The Moror [mohr-or] or bitter herb (represented with a
 8 small slice of horseradish) is symbolic of the hardships,
 9 which the Israelites endured when they were slaves in
 10 Egypt.



- 12 3. The Haroses [hahr-oh-seth] is a kind of paste of
 13 apples, almonds, raisins, and wine symbolic of the mortar
 14 the Israelites used when they were slaves in the
 15 construction for the Pharaoh of the treasure cities Pithom
 16 and Ramses.
- 18 4. The Shank Bone is symbolic of the Paschal Lamb that was sacrificed and eaten on the eve of the Passover.
- 5. The Hard-boiled Egg is symbolic of life and springtime when nature renews life.
- 24 6. The Cup of Wine (purple grape juice) is commemorative
 25 of the promise made by God to Moses to redeem the
 26 Israelites by bringing them out of bondage.
- An explanation of these symbols of the Mystic Banquet gives the ceremony much of its true meaning; however, the preceding explanation is not ritualistic and, hence, need not be included as such in any ceremony. It is not permissible to substitute an actual banquet for the Mystic Banquet although a dinner preceding the ceremony is appropriate. See the report of the Committee on Rituals and Ceremonial Forms, Transactions 1947, page 294, which reads in part as follows:
- It is difficult for us to make a rule that should be followed in all the Bodies, because in some Valleys, members travel a long distance to attend the Services, and a dinner preceding the [ceremony] is found desirable. We think they should not, at this time, be forbidden. In the larger Valleys no problem arises because of the old custom

The most prominent features on the table should be 27 the lights and the unused goblet. The candles are lit by 28 the Master of Ceremonies following the Mystic Banquet (or 29 the optional ten-minute address). The meat of the roasted 30 lamb should be cut into small pieces, each secured to a 31 toothpick, with the bone left in the center of the plate. 32 33 [Optional Distribution Ceremony: Consideration should be 34 given to audience participation. If, however, there are 35 more than thirty people in the gathering, it may be wise to

36 limit distribution of the Mystic Banquet to the actual







On the tenth 3 day of the first month, the people were ordered to 4 take a lamb in its first year, without blemish, 5 arrange themselves by families in numbers suitable 6 for its consumption, and keep the lamb until the 7 fourteenth day of the month when it was to be 8 slain, roasted, and eaten with unleavened bread. 9 The blood of the lamb was also placed on the 10 doorposts and lintels of the houses during this 11 observance. The Destroying Angel, seeing this 12 blood, passed over the homes of the Hebrews and 13 slew the firstborn of the Egyptians. 14 blood of the Passover Lamb symbolized the 15 redemption and is here thus symbolized by the 16 shank bone. 17 18 This ceremony of Passover is observed by the 19 Jewish people to this day. 20 21 Senior Warden gestures to each as he mentions them Points to each item 23 The moror, or bitter herbs, is symbolic of the 24 hardships, which the Israelites endured while they mentioned 25 were slaves in Egypt. 26 27 The haroseth, a paste of apples, almonds, raisins 28 and wine is symbolic of the mortar the Israelites 29 used in the construction of the Pharaohs' treasure 30 cities of Pithem and Ramses. 31 32 The salt and hard-boiled egg is symbolic of 33 hardship and renewal. 35 Two thousand years ago Jesus of Nazareth also 36 celebrated the Passover Feast with His Disciples. 37 His observance of this Feast is now known by 38 Christians as the Last Supper.
